On Wednesday Year 9 and 10 students travelled to Ruapekapeka pā, Kororāreka and Te Rau Aroha. All three places that our students visited had significant historical value to the kaupapa of our Kura in recognising how far we have come as a people and to also remind us of the mahi that we still to do in moving forward as a kura.

Ruapekapeka pā was an important site to visit because it gave students the opportunity to walk a real pā and saw the innovation of Te Ruki Kawiti and the creation of trench warfare.

Kororāreka was an Insite into the beginnings of a nation and the conflict that happened in this little settlement. Students visited Maiki Hill where Hone Heke chopped the flagpole down on several occasions.

Te Rau Aroha is always a special place to visit and learn about Te Hokowhitu ā Tūmātauenga. Matua Louis gave some awesome kōrero which also linked our students to our kura and how important ACAD is to our kura.

Although the trip was quick it was important for our students to learn and understand more about our history of what has happened since these events and more importantly the work that still needs to be done.
