Through a number of classroom activities, discussions, and reflections, students have been encouraged to move their thinking from "I can't do this" to "I can't do this yet." They are developing the understanding of how to push through difficult tasks and thinking and having the confidence to take risks in their learning. Whakataukī such as "Waiho i te toipoto, kaua i te toiroa" have supported their understanding of the importance of collaboration and how to get along with their peers. Everyday is a new day to get things right again.

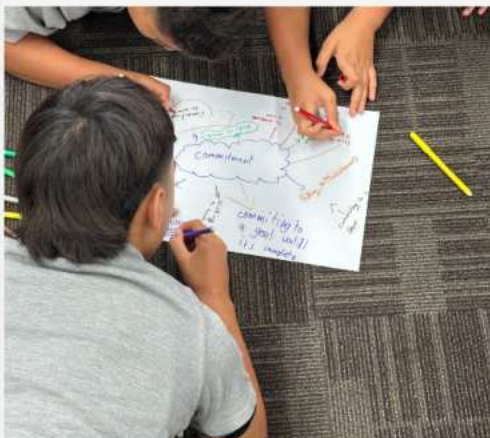

Kia Mātau – Kia Māori - Kia Tu Rangatira ai

This week, Paetawhiti completed their Taiao research, confidently presenting their learning to their peers in class. It was a great opportunity for students to share their knowledge, reflect on their understanding, and celebrate their progress and achievements together in the spirit of Tuakana - Teina.

Minamina and Jayme-Rose - How did Māori navigate across the Pacific?

When our tupuna sailed the oceans they used to have to navigate using their surroundings. For example they used the sun, moon, and stars as compasses, while also observing ocean swells, patterns in the winds and the behaviour of the birds all to head in the right direction. Usually, the modern day waka hourua are made with fiberglass and the more traditional waka which are made with kauri or totara. Having a waka with less volume makes it much faster, lighter, and easier to sail over shallow waters, reefs and estuaries. It will even make going over waves a breeze. But be careful, when boarding luggage on to the waka you have to make sure it is all balanced or this will cause the waka stress.

Melita and Luyca - How did Māori navigate across the Pacific?

Māori people navigated the Pacific with their waka and waka hourua. Our tupuna invented the waka and used it to sail over to Aotearoa, but we also use the waka to transport food, whānau and other essentials. Our ancestors would use the sun, moon and the star paths that lie in the sky to get where they need to go. They also used the water and the currents that run through the moana while also using the wind to predict which direction they would go, along with the weather and how it looked. Navigators rely on what they see, hear and feel to know where they are heading to.

Khaznae - How will this knowledge help me in navigating or understanding the moana?

I believe there's three main keys for me. Which are opportunities, identity, and respect. Knowing the knowledge of navigating is an open door for opportunities like sailing to Tonga, who knows? It really helps knowing what our tupuna invented and understanding the many purposes of our waka. Respect, respecting the tikanga of understanding our moana is important, if we understand the moana, the moana is able to understand us to our fullest potential.

Aorangi - How might this mātāuranga help in navigating or understanding the Moana?

Mātāuranga Māori is the knowledge that Māori people have passed down for many years. It helps people understand and travel across the moana. Māori used the stars, waves, birds, and clouds to find their way across the moana. They also knew when it was a good time to fish or travel by looking at the moon and tides. This knowledge helped them care for the ocean and only take what they needed. Māori people also believe the ocean is very special and should be treated with respect. Today, this knowledge is still used and mixed with science to help look after the ocean and teach young people how to care for it.

PAERANGI

Firstly a massive mihi to Tyrecce Tuhiwai-Wharepapa for his stand at Nga Manu Korero in the Pei Te Hurinui Jones section (Senior Māori) section. Tyrecce had to write and prepare a 12 minute speech as well as compete in an impromptu section where he was given a topic and had 2 minutes to prepare, then korero for 3 minutes on that topic.

Tyrecce has represented Te Kāpehu Whetū at Nga Manu Korero for the last 3 years and we are so proud of his effort and commitment to representing TKW on the regional stage.



Paerangi ākonga are in the middle of their preparation for their art and wearable art projects for Matariki. The Year 11 kōhine have been able to spend valuable time with Whaea Hera to help conceptualise their ideas and they are well under away for Week 8 celebrations.
