



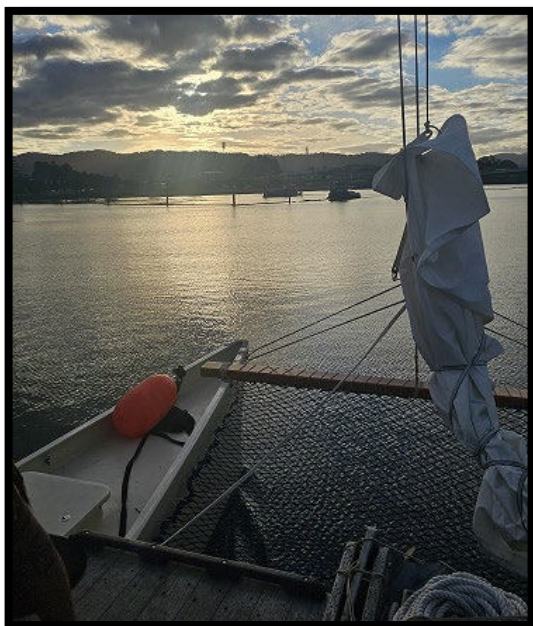

PANUI MO TE WIKI TUAWHĀ

Kia ora e te whānau,
This week has been another full and busy one for Paetata as we near the halfway mark of term 2, there has been plenty of learning happening both inside and outside the classroom. Although the weather from last weekend meant we had to postpone our regular Monday Parihaka trek, we made the most of the opportunity by taking a hīkoi around the Hātea Loop instead. As part of our Pakanga o Aotearoa inquiry, we also visited the historic site of Ruapekapeka Pā, deepening our understanding of local history and the legacy of the New Zealand Wars. Paetata ākonga engaged in learning aboard the waka Hinemoana II with Whaea Joelene, experiencing a different kind of classroom on the water.



RUAPEKAPEKA PĀ

As part of our ongoing inquiry into Ngā Pakanga o Aotearoa, Paetata has been exploring various significant pā sites throughout Te Tai Tokerau and wider Aotearoa. This week, to deepen our understanding and bring our learning to life, we had the privilege of visiting Ruapekapeka Pā—a powerful and historical site of resistance during the Northern War. For many of our ākonga, stepping foot on this whenua offered a unique chance to connect classroom learning with real-world experience. The stories we have read and the kōrero we've had in class came alive as ākonga walked the grounds, visualised the layout of the pā, and imagined what life may have been like during a time of invasion and conflict with British troops.



The opportunity to run around and engage physically with the space helped ākonga reflect on the courage and strategy of our tūpuna.

This experience was made more meaningful by the presence of some of our ākonga who whakapapa to the area, offering a personal link to the history and mana of Ruapekapeka. Their connection gave a collective understanding and respect for the site.

Ākonga chose to reflect in silence, some laughed and played, some looked out toward the horizon over the vast whenua of Ngāti Hine. We look forward to our next haerenga to Rangiriri Waikato at the end of this term.

LEARNING WITHOUT A ROOF

At Paetata, the idea that powerful learning doesn't always happen within four walls. Learning without a roof is a concept that recognises the value of taking learning beyond the traditional classroom—into spaces that ignite curiosity, deepen engagement, and connect students to the real world around them.

This week, our Te Reo Matatini writing sessions took place not at desks, but on the deck of Hinemoana II, a waka hourua that has become a floating classroom for our kaupapa waka inquiry. Ākonga reflected on their time aboard the waka and used this experience as the inspiration for their writing. Being immersed in the very environment they were learning about allowed their ideas to flow more naturally.

"Kia Tū Rangatira Ai - Learning as Leaders in the Taiao

This week, ākonga continued their exciting learning in Te Taiao Māori. They took part in Water Safety lessons at the Aquatic Centre with Whaea Joelene, gaining confidence and learning how to stay safe in and around water.

Akonga enjoy learning about traditional Māori navigation and how waka sails were made in the past over hundreds of years ago, using harakeke. Before cutting the flax, they learned about the right tikanga, karakia and how to harvest with care and respect.

Future Pathways

We encourage our ākonga to be focussing on their future and to explore possible career pathways. Students should think about careers that align with their individual interests, strengths, and aspirations.

Hands-on experience is invaluable in making informed career choices. We work with Northtec to engage our ākonga in short courses in cookery, engineering, mechanics and hospitality. We are in the process of trying to establish more work experience placements where students will be out in the work place for 1-2 days per week. If anyone is interested and able to awhi a student in their work place please let us know.

Matua Neville is working with the Year 11 cohort to build CV's and interview skills to help them seek part time work and gain some much-needed experience. He is also looking at taking groups of students into various workplaces to observe and see what a day in that job is actually like.

The journey from school to the next phase of life is a significant transition. By actively engaging in career exploration, gaining practical experience, seeking guidance, and reflecting on personal strengths, Year 11–13 students can make informed decisions that align with their aspirations. Remember, the path you choose is a stepping stone toward a fulfilling future.
